

There was a real feeling that our Society was up and running again this year. After the disappointments of 2020 we had a tremendous success early in the year with our online exhibition. Thanks to Yvonne Jerrold's efforts this ran incredibly well. We wondered whether we might be going online again in the autumn but thankfully, as the time approached, we realised we would be able to 'go live' again! Not at the Leys, our usual autumn venue, but at the Pitt Building and thanks, as ever, to Steve Ashman's organising skill and hard work, plus some 'beyond the call of duty' help from the staff at the Pitt, it ran like clockwork. It was a tremendous feeling to be there before the start, setting up the display screens, untangling all the hanging wires and balancing on step ladders as we put the exhibition together. 
forthcoming presentation

The Light Fantastic by Jane Fellows

Jane has worked in the Stained Glass Museum in Ely Cathedral for the past 10 years and has been greatly inspired by the colours, textures and luminosity of the glass in creating her own artwork. The Stained Glass Museum is the only museum dedicated to

stained glass in the UK and houses a unique collection spanning over 800 years of history. take place In this forthcoming presentation Jane will give us a guided tour of the history and production of stained glass and we'll take a look at her experiments with watercolour, pastel, acrylic pouring inks and collage to name a few. FRAN GODWOOD

Originally trained in Graphic Design at St. Martin's School of Art in London, Fran Godwood now concentrates on producing original fine-art. Fran takes her inspiration from local gardens and old buildings, and she also enjoys sketching chickens and geese going about their business.

She works in pen and watercolour, using permanent ink to pick out the textures, shapes and details of her subject, adding watercolour last. After gaining a certificate in printmaking at the Curwen Print Study Centre, she now creates hand-coloured linocuts as well as paintings.

During the



Covid-19 pandemic Fran focused on her garden, aiming to make it a suitable subject for her art. Since lockdown

restrictions were eased, she has

worked further afield and has visited Wimpole Hall, the Mary Challis Garden in Sawston and Peckover House, Wisbech in pursuit of inspiration.

A CDS member since 1990, Fran is a regular exhibitor at Society shows. In 2018 she was elected as a member of the Society of East Anglian Watercolourists and she also participates the Cambridge Open Studios. All being well, and after two pandemic-related postponements, Fran hopes to have a solo exhibition at Saffron Walden in the summer of next year, from May 23rd until June 18th.



It was a real pleasure to stage a physical Autumn exhibition after an absence of two years, more so as it proved to be a very successful event. 99 members (including 12 new members) exhibited 353 framed works or sculpture. 66 works were sold by 44 artists. The total value of works sold was £15,267 and the total value of greeting card sales was £1,695. Over 2,600 people visited the exhibition.

For the first time the Society offered three £50 vouchers for a Friends of the Society prize draw. The winners were; Rani Drew, Janet Whiteman and Derek Holley.








